
- 1. The human impact of war was enormous, with at least 12 million people killed and 20 million severely wounded. Canada had 64,944 military deaths and 2000 civilian deaths. It also had an additional 149,732 military wounded.
- 2. The death toll and deep public grief led to the commissioning of war cemeteries, memorials and cenotaphs.
- 3. Artillery left tens of thousands of men disabled or limbless, forcing the rapid growth in prosthetic limbs and devices.
- 4. Thousands were affected by 'shell shock', a psychological trauma for which there were few effective treatments.
- 5. The war was also remembered and criticised by literature, sometimes by men who had experienced it first-hand, and in the fledging movie industry, in films such as the 1930 classic *All Quiet on the Western Front.*
